

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The Danish National Tax Tribunal decided an appeal on access to information received in an exchange of information, see SKM 2021.253 LSR (https://skat.dk/data.aspx?oid=2303674&lang=da). The taxpayer requested access to information relating to the exchange of information on the taxpayer between Denmark and Luxembourg and more specifically access to cover letters, e-mails, and other documents initiating the procedure between the Danish Competent Authority and the Luxembourg Competent Authority.

The Danish Competent Authority declined the request for information stating that the e-mails and schematic forms in question were exempt from access to information under sec. 15 of the Danish Public Administration Act. On appeal the Danish National Tax Tribunal upheld the decision of the Danish Competent Authority. The Tribunal cited art. 26 (2) of the DTC between Denmark and Luxembourg and noted that this provision specifically states that exchanged information is confidential and as such covered by the exemption of access to information under national Danish law in sec. 15 a (1) of the Public Administration Act which exempts information which is confidential under international obligations from access to information. The Tribunal also drew attention to the fact that the Tribunal itself had reviewed the documents and information in question and confirmed the nature of the documents and information. The Tribunal noted that the Danish Competent Authority had asked the Luxembourg Competent Authority whether the information in question should be regarded as confidential, and the Luxembourg Competent Authority had confirmed this. On this basis, the Tribunal was satisfied that the documents and information were exempt from access to information and stated that art. 26 (2) of the DTC does not only place an obligation of confidentiality on the substantial information exchanged, but also on contextual information such as cover letters.

The case is interesting not only from the point of access to information and exchange of information. The Danish National Tax Tribunal heard the appeal even though the appeal concerned a decision of the Danish Competent Authority. Decisions of the Danish Competent Authority ordinarily fall outside the scope of appeals to the National Tax Tribunal, see Danish Western High Court in SKM 2016.354 V on instigating the mutual agreement procedure under the EU-Arbitration Convention (90/436/EEC). Hearing the appeal on access to information, the National Tax Tribunal however appeared to distinguish between appeals concerning the specific powers of the Competent Authority and powers that are not specific to the Competent Authority. Since access to information is based not on any special powers of the Competent Authority but on internal Danish general administrative law, the Tribunal seems to have reasoned that the appeal fell within the scope of the Tribunal's jurisdiction as any other appeal on access to information regardless of the origin of the appealed decision.
